## **U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS FORMER ERIE ARMY DEPOT ORDNANCE REMOVAL PROJECT WRAPPED UP**

**PORT CLINTON, OH (December 7, 2009)** – The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers completed the removal of approximately 11.5 tons of munitions debris from the beach area near the Former Erie Army Depot in early November. During the final venting event on Wednesday, November 4, 223 items of material potentially presenting an explosive hazard were explosively vented. None of these items contained an explosive hazard.

This surface removal action reduced the risk to the public and the environment from potential unexploded ordnance washed up onto the beach from the former impact area in Lake Erie. Unexploded ordnance found during the removal was destroyed in place or in designated areas by detonation. Experts used hand-held ordnance detection devices to search the area. When metal was detected, the area was excavated by hand to the extent necessary to fully identify, remove, and destroy any partially exposed munitions and explosives. This removal recovered 2,501 items with no explosive hazard. Only four of the items recovered throughout the removal contained an explosive hazard. The recovered items weigh approximately 23,096 pounds and were recycled as scrap metal.

The overall effort was fully coordinated with officials from the Army Corps, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, the Ohio National Guard, and the affected property owners. This removal was performed under Economy Act Authority and is funded through the Office of Economic Adjustment (2008 funds). The funds were sponsored by Congresswoman Kaptur and appropriated by Congress.

Residents are reminded of “the three Rs” of unexploded ordnance safety: recognize, retreat and report. If a suspicious item or a possible munition is discovered, remember that it can be dangerous. Do not touch, kick, throw something or do anything else to disturb the item. Also remember that old munitions are sometimes not readily identifiable, and may appear to be any other metallic or rusty item. Use, caution, leave it alone and do not touch it. If you know or suspect that you have found a possible munition, mark the area with a small item, such as a hat or pen, and immediately walk away on the same path you came in on. Do not run. Report the location of the suspicious item immediately to your local law enforcement officials by dialing 911.
