## nadioacticity test on LOOW site soil proves negative

Tests on clay taken to the Love Canal chemical dump from the Lake Ontario Ordnance Works in Lewiston did not indicate radioactivity, officials said Monday.

The state Department of Environmental Conservation and the state Health Department conducted the tests after receiving an anonymous telephone call alerting them to the possibility of radioactivity, Nelson Walter said. Walter is the DEC's site coordinator for Love Canal sewer cleanup.

Walter said more than 200 truckloads — about 2,000 cubic yards — of clay were taken to the dump between Dec. 23 and Jan. 2. The clay will be used as fill around the dewatering facility under construction at the site.

The facility will separate liquids from the sewer sediments once sewer cleanup begins.

The Sevenson Containment Corporation is the contractor for sewer cleanup. Walter said it was the company's responsibility to bring the clay to the site.

"When we heard it might be radioactive, we went out with Geiger counters and measured it," Walter said. "We also contacted the Lake Ontario Ordnance Works and they were sure it wasn't radioactive. We contacted the contractor and they had checked and had documentation that it was not radioactive."

The Geiger counter tests were conducted by Walter and by a state Health Department official based in Buffalo. The tests showed background levels of radiation, which Nelson said are low levels naturally found in the earth.

William O'Brien of the health department's Buffalo office agreed. "We did a test of the soil supposedly contaminated and didn't find any radioactivity beyond background levels. There was no indication of radioactivity," he said.

The Lake Ontario Ordnance Works on Pletcher Road was a 7,500-acre site owned by the U.S. Army. In 1944, it became the dumping ground for waste from the Manhattan Project atomic bomb research. Between 1955 and 1968, the government sold all but 190 acres of contaminated property on the site.

In 1983, the energy department began excavating thousands of cubic yards of radioactively-contaminated soil from the site.
