interstate commerce under 328.3(a)(3)(i-iii) (See Section IVB of this form). The closest water of the U.S. to any of these isolated wetlands would be Wetland 2 which is between 1/10th mile and 3/10th mile from these isolated wetlands. A shed, garage, gas well, driveway, house and lawn are also located between the majority of these isolated wetlands and Wetland 2 which make any hidden subsurface connection unlikely. Nor is there any ecological interconnection between these isolated wetlands and the nearest water of the U.S. which is Wetland 2. The majority of these isolated wetlands are located within successional old fields. Wetland 2 is located in woodlands. Wetland 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 are therefore considered to be intrastate, non-navigable, isolated waters.

If the waterbody⁴ is not an RPW, or a wetland directly abutting an RPW, a JD will require additional data to determine if the waterbody has a significant nexus with a TNW. If the tributary has adjacent wetlands, the significant nexus evaluation must consider the tributary in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands. This significant nexus evaluation that combines, for analytical purposes, the tributary and all of its adjacent wetlands is used whether the review area identified in the JD request is the tributary, or its adjacent wetlands, or both. C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

Draw connections between the features documented and the effects on the TNW, as identified in the *Rapanos* Guidance and discussed in the Instructional Guidebook. Factors to consider include, for example:

Wetland 19 (0.096 acres) have no potential to affect interstate commerce under 328.3(a)(3)(i-iii) (See Section IVB of this form). Furthermore, the closest water of the U.S. to any of these isolated wetlands would be the unnamed tributary to Stony Bottom Creek which is located approximately 250 feet south and west of gravel driveways which effectively sever any hydrologic connection. No culverts beneath the driveways exist and no evidence of overland flow over the driveway is apparent. Additionally, the topography of this area slopes west which is not in the direction of the tributary effectively eliminating any possibility of a hydrologic connection. Nor is there any ecological interconnection between these isolated wetlands and the unnamed tributary to Stony Bottom Creek and abutting Wetland 10. The isolated wetlands are located within successional shrubland and old field communities. Stony Bottom Creek and abutting Wetland 10 flow through successional northern hardwood communities.
